HOW WE ASSIST

For over 40 years, Australian Lions Hearing Dogs (ALHD) has provided over 670 Australians a set of 'furry ears' free of charge.

This program was made possible from the ongoing support of our generous donors, supporters and Lions Clubs all across Australia.

Australian Lions Hearing Dogs was initially founded in 1980 when two Lions, PDG Bob Allen and PDG Brian Carter, attended an International Lions Convention in the US and discovered the Hearing Dog Training Centre in Colorado. The idea was adopted and brought back to Australia, where the Lions Clubs of Australia and Lions Clubs International Foundation voted to fund the launch of Australian Lions Hearing Dogs. Deafness or profound hearing loss is predicted to impact one in four Australians by 2050. Currently, more than 400,000 Australians are suffering with severe or profound hearing loss. Factors impacting these difficulties range from our aging population to noise or occupation induced hearing loss. Many of our Hearing Dog recipients are deaf from birth as well. Hearing loss affects more than just an individual, it flows onto their families and friends.

OUR PATRON

As patron, I am delighted that your organisation has delivered 32 Assistance Dogs in the last year - the highest number since the organisation was founded in 1980.

Last year also saw the placement of the first ever Australian Lions Medical Alert dog, an 18 months old Labradoodle named Sal, who can detect the scent of a hypoglycaemic event and react accordingly.

Earlier this year, I had the privilege of visiting the Australian Lions Hearing Dogs National Training Centre in Verdun to see firsthand the life-changing services that you provide.

I was struck by the extensive sound work and public training that each dog must undertake before it is placed with its new owner. Being aware of sounds such as smoke alarms, alarm clocks, text messages, and phone calls, not only makes a real difference to deaf people's lives - it can also save them.

As well as serving as their recipients' ears, they provide the equally important benefit of companionship, and give people who are hard of hearing confidence to reconnect with their family, friends and community. With one in six Australians experiencing some form of hearing loss, dogs that are specifically trained to support the needs of hearing-impaired people, are crucial.

I also enjoyed hearing about plans for redevelopment of the Verdun centre, and subsequent expansion of the training centre. This is a significant step which will quadruple the number of service dogs provided to people with disabilities.

I thank the extraordinary contribution of Lions Clubs across Australia and their dedicated members who, through a wide range of fundraising activites, ensure each Lions Hearing Dog can continue to be given to people free of charge, and also provide important follow up to ensure that all is going well with each dog placed.

A special thanks to the donors, supporters, puppy raisers and volunteers for their support which enables the Australian Lions Hearing Dogs to provide the wonderful service that it does.

I remain honoured to be the patron of Australian Lions Hearing Dogs, and I commend all who are involved for another successful year of helping people who are hard of hearing or deaf to lead independent and connected lives.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Australian Lions Hearing Dogs (ALHD) program was founded in 1980. following the success of a similar program in the United States.

The training centre in Verdun was purchased and the first Australian Lions Hearing Dog, Amber, was delivered in 1982. Since then, over 670 Hearing Assistance have been placed with recipients in Australia, free of charge, with the involvement of local Lions Clubs.

One in six Australians suffer from some form of hearing loss. This not only affects them but also their family and friends.

Each individual's needs are different, and this is where our Hearing Assistance Dogs are trained to assist with their specific needs.

The development of a Medical Alert Dog Program, with a focus on training and providing Diabetic Alert Dogs for people with type 1 diabetes, has been a priority of the program over the last couple of years. The first diabetic alert dog 'Sal' was delivered in October 2022 to a woman with type 1 diabetes in South Australia. It has been proven successful. More Diabetic Alert Dogs will be trained and delivered in 2023.



Recent years has also seen the development of the Volunteer Program, which sees our band of enthusiastic volunteers working with our staff and dogs in training.

Our Breeding Program has provided several litters and our Puppy Program, where puppies are fostered out to local members of the community until they are mature enough to start training, both have proven to be financially viable and have overall been greatly beneficial to the program.

Our success has of course come with a cost. Our facilities are now in need of a major overhaul. Plans for construction of new facilities for the current site at Verdun have been lodged for approval and we are hopeful that the upgrading of our facilities will commence later this year.

> It will ultimately enable the training and delivery of over 100 dogs per year in the coming years.

The board approved a restructure of the Training program in December 2022. This will allow for the staff to further enhance their skills as a body, allowing growth as well as personal advancement within the team.

The success of the program is attributed to our staff, volunteers, **Board of Directors and the Lions** Clubs of Australia.

They all have a passion for helping others and we are grateful for their continued commitment to the program.

CEO'S REPORT

With the majority of restrictions placed upon us due to the pandemic now gone, 2022 saw Australian Lions Hearing Dogs dealing with the lasting impact. Despite it all, we continued from strength to strength in the delivery of both new and existing services to Australians in need.

Firstly, the year saw 31 placements of Hearing Assistance Dogs. Our specialty Hearing Assistance Dog team grew in numbers and continued to refine and evolve our existing program to take advantage of technological advances and our new breeding program to provide more engaging services to our recipients. Zoom and Facetime have been particularly helpful in making us more present during follow up training and allowing us to support both recipients and sponsoring Lions Clubs in real time.

We celebrated our very first placement of a **Medical Alert Dog with Sal going to her** new home in October.

Within the placement week, Sal was consistently alerting her new recipient to lows in blood glucose levels (BGL), including in public settings with high distraction. In one instance, Sal alert to a drop in BGL 15 minutes before the technology did, further highlighting the need for our services to people suffering type 1 diabetes.

Our infant Breeding Program continued to develop with the arrival of three labradoodle litters throughout the year, with a fuller program planned for 2023. Puppies from our very first litter have now entered the training program and will be placed in early 2023. Support for our Breeding Program in the form of both naming and monthly sponsors has been amazing, helping to fund and further develop the program.

The outlook for 2023 is positive, with our Medical Alert Dog program placing a number of dogs both locally and interstate, our Hearing Assistance Dog program continuing to meet demand and our **Training Centre expansion** finally breaking ground.




