We look forward to welcoming all those who can make it to our Open Day on the 15th April, right before National Hearing Dog Day on the 19th April.







Faye recently passed her Public Access Test and Task Assessment. One area that she could improve at is her settling, so that will be our focus. This will mean lots of coffee outings, going out for lunch, sitting down in busy shopping centres and going into the Training Centre, not to train but to relax. Faye's scent training is coming along nicely and she is excellent at all of her trained tasks - the Hypokit retrieve, Emergency phone task and "get help" command. She is a great dog and I am excited for her!

Belle is also doing well. She is great at her scent work and Hypokit retrieving tasks. She does get very excited when I take her out to bustling places, so we will focus on getting her use to being around different environmental stimulations.

There will also be more puppies joining the MAD program soon. Josie, from Maddie's litter, has been chosen to be our next MAD dog in training, plus a few more from our next litter (Bonnie's puppies) once they grow up!





One of MAD's best pups in training is Mali. She's so clever and amazing, already progressing in her training beyond what is expected at her age.

Mali is now working on high blood glucose level (BGL) scent training. Her heel work is amazing and she has great obedience!

Bailey loves other dogs, and he often gets extremely excited when he sees


a chance to play with them.

SOME SIGNS FOR GOOD HEALTH

COAT: A healthy coat, short or long, is glossy and pliable, without dandruff, bald spots, or excessive oiliness.EYES: Healthy eyes are bright and shiny. Mucus and watery tears are normal but should be minimal and clear.EARS: The skin inside your dog's ears should be light pink and clean. There should be some yellow or brownish wax, but a large amount of wax or crust is abnormal.

NOSE: A dog's nose is usually cool and moist. However, a dry nose doesn't always mean they're sick. Taking their temperature is a better indication of illness.

HEARING AWARENESS WEEK_



Hearing Awareness Week 2023 will start on March 1st to March 7th. It is an annual event that highlights and spreads awareness of the issues affecting Australians living with hearing loss to the public.

Currently, about 3.5 million Australians aged 15 and over - 22% of the population - have mild to severe hearing loss. An average of one to six Australians experience some form of hearing loss, and the number is expecting to rise to one to four by 2050.

This Hearing Awareness Week is an ongoing effort to improve the issues that people with hearing loss face. It also helps the public to approach hearing loss more seriously and learn of the impact our hearing health can have to our quality of life, social engagement, career and confidence.
