

CEO UPDATE

We are now in the final push towards the end of the year and at this stage, it is predicted that we will have placed a total of 30 Hearing Dogs throughout 2022 by the end of December!

However, our work is not done yet; there is still a lot more to do this year. Just recently, we were welcomed with the pitter patter of tiny puppy feet in the Training Centre, this plus the placement of our very first Medical Alert Dog here in South Australia!

Planning for 2023 has already begun and though our expansion has been delayed slightly, we won't let that sway us. Instead, we will hold our annual Open Day, which has been scheduled for the 15th of April, just before National Hearing Dog Day. Look for more information in the coming months around both Open Day and our Recipient Training Day, which will be planned for the day before Open Day.

The Training Centre will be closing throughout the upcoming holiday season, although we will have people onsite to look after all of our dogs. The office will be closed from COB on the 23rd of December, reopening on the 3rd of January. Our emergency phone will still be active throughout this time if anything urgent occurs and require immediate attention.

SAL & ELIZA

The first Lions Diabetic Alert Dog, Sal, was delivered free-of-charge on the 17th of October in Adelaide, South Australia. For Eliza, receiving Sal was like two long lost friends finding one another.

'I've wanted a Diabetic Alert Dog ever since I heard of them. But I also knew it was an expensive process, plus getting the right dog... well, I never thought about it too much further.

Diabetes is a very expensive illness to live with. While it has been cheaper with recent government subsidies, prior to this year, it probably cost me about \$7,000 a year just to live with diabetes. Adding the cost of training a dog, it was not sustainable, not on top of mortgage and everything else.

When I heard about the Lions Medical Alert Dog Program, well, I got in contact with Laura. And getting Sal has been great!

She fits me so well.

I just take her everywhere, it's almost like having new baby! I get my little bag and off we go. Knowing that she isn't just a best friend but could also save my life by bringing me lollies... it's pretty astounding.

I think Sal has definitely bonded with me. I'm like her mum and she my daughter. Sal has actually picked up my hypos (low blood glucose) since day one. Our first week together she had alerted to four hypo events. This happened while I was cooking or while we were out at a café; she knew her priorities even with all the smells around her. Plus, I can imagine my hypos would smell very different from the samples she was trained with, so for her to pick it up and come straight to me was pretty amazing.

I'm pretty confident with her stepping up and pressing the emergency button or getting my hypo kit if I need it. I've had her excitedly playing with her toys, and when I pretended to pass out on the floor, she always runs to the button. No matter how distracted she is, I know she'll be there for me.

In the past I've had a lot of hypos overnight that I didn't wake up to. Luckily, I never ended up in the hospital, but I had family to rely on to wake me up each morning and see if I was alive. I was, obviously, but a lot of the times I could barely swallow!

Knowing Sal picks up my hypos early on sort of takes that anxiety away. It earned me that peace of mind. I also live a pretty active lifestyle; it helps me with my diabetes, but it can make things tough too. I play golf and cricket, and sometimes it can be very long games. This makes adjusting my insulin requirements accordingly a bit tough. Not only that, I can often go low, 6 or 12 hours down the track following exercise. Sal will certainly get rid of some of those worries especially when she picks up the hypos as early as she does!

I'm hoping at my work where I consult in other people who also have diabetes, Sal will pick up other people's hypos as well as my own. Even with just the excitement from people knowing that Diabetic Alert Dogs exist, people might show up to their appointments more and take their diabetes more seriously. We have two other staff members with type one diabetes as well. They're really looking forward to having her there!'





MEDICAL ALERT DOG PROGRAM

With Sal delivered, we now turn our eyes on Faye and Belle.

Faye is in full-time training and she is working very well. Her scent training is progressing nicely. She is becoming an expert with the Hypokit Retrieve task and always remembers where to grab it from. It didn't take Faye long to learn that she must carry the Hypokit up onto the bed if I am laying there. Faye is also learning that if I lay on the floor, she must press the emergency button. In the home, this will



be connected to a phone system that will call a list of emergency contacts until someone answers. Faye is working on the 'get help' task too. When she hears the command, she must locate someone else, touch them to alert and they will follow her back to me. She loves to work and is always keen for the next task!

Belle's full-time training has also now commenced! She is very energetic, loves to play and likes to work. She is very good at the Hypokit Retrieve task and is progressing well with the emergency phone task and 'get help' task. Her scent training is also going well.

Lily has had a short break from coming to ALHD for her weekly training day while she recovered from a fear phase. This is a natural phase in a puppy's development when they are scared of random, irrational things. She will re-commence her training at the start of November. Mali and Bailey are two pups from Daisy's litter at ALHD. They have entered the Medical Alert Dog Program to see if they have what it takes!



Both pups are doing very well in the Program so far. They have started basic retrieve training and are learning how to do one paw touches.

Their obedience is improving week by week and they are very comfortable being at ALHD and playing with the other dogs.

The two of them are very confident and a cute couple of rascals.

WORLD DIABETES DAY

14th of November marks World Diabetes Day 2022. This year's theme for the day focuses on "education to protect tomorrow".

Type 1 Diabetes (T1D) is a chronic genetic condition; an autoimmune reaction where the body attacks itself by mistake and destroys the cells in the pancreas that make insulin. The pancreas provides and controls insulin production. Without it, this leads to high or low blood glucose levels, which can be fatal.

There are no solid answers as to why or how T1D is developed, but it typically appears early in life. Symptoms of T1D include thirst, frequent urination, hunger, fatigue and blurred vision. While there is - so far - no cure for T1D, there are several treatments available.

World Diabetes Day provides an opportunity to raise awareness and educate people of diabetes as a global public health issue and what needs to be done, collectively and individually, for better diagnosis and management of the conditions.

Diabetes is also a global focus for Lions International and ALHD are proud to contribute to the healthy management of diabetes for Australians with type 1 diabetes through our provision of Diabetic Alert Dogs.



ALHD'S DAY AT ADELAIDE HIGH

As part of National Week of Deaf People, two trainers of Australian Lions Hearing Dogs, Mary and Laura, visited the Centre for Deaf & Hard of Hearing (CDHH) at Adelaide High School on the 19th of September.

The trainers started with meeting all nineteen students from CDHH, as well as the mainstream students that were learning Auslan, before moving onto their talk about Hearing Assistance Dogs. They talked about how we source the dogs in the ALHD programs, as well as how we train and deliver them.



Bear was later introduced and he was an immediate hit amongst the crowd, especially after nailing his demonstrations right in the middle of class. The kids were also excited to learn that Bear's L jacket was coming off the week after as he was so close to being delivered!

Mary and Laura were interviewed afterwards for the

school's daily bulletin. The CDHH students had also set up a cake stall to raise funds for ALHD; giving the trainers a perfect chance to share more about hearing loss and Hearing Assistance Dogs.

All in all it was a successful day and ALHD wanted to thank Adelaide High for inviting us along to participate in their National Week of Deaf People!
